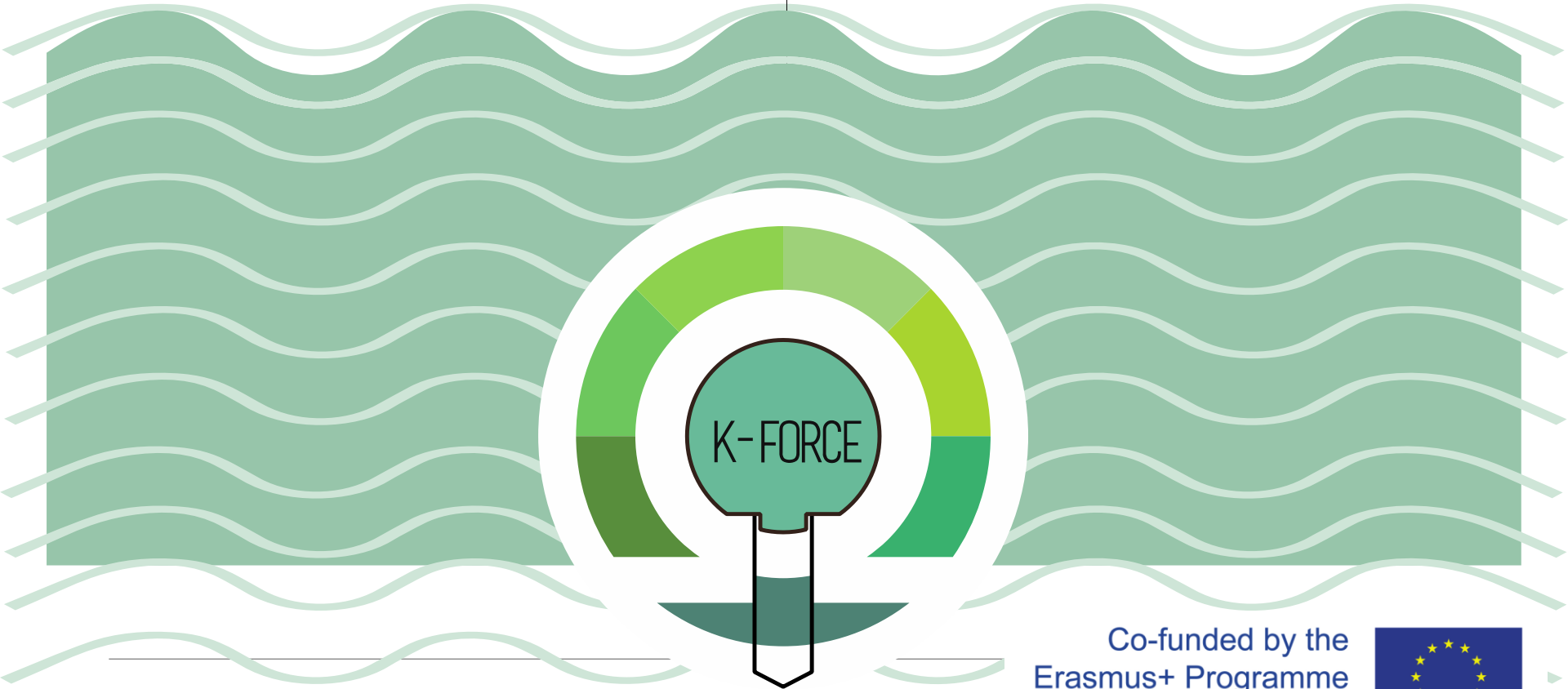

I would suggest to remove words (or modify to more specific ones) for which it is not clear the context they are used. For instance, I am not sure in which context you want to use the word "attack" (is this a terrorist attack? Fire attack?). Similarly, you might want to define security in the specific context of disaster risk management. Apart from this, I think most of the definition seems taken from reliable sources (e.g. ISO)
